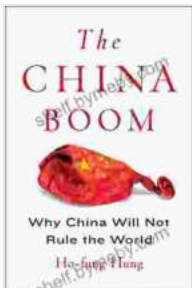


Why China Will Not Rule the World

Political factors

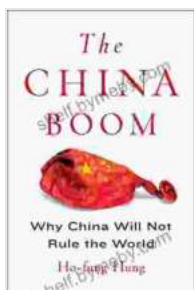

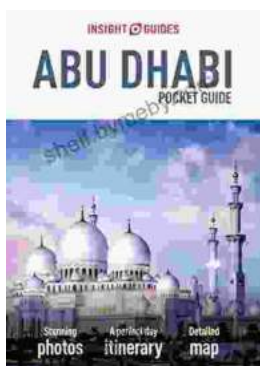

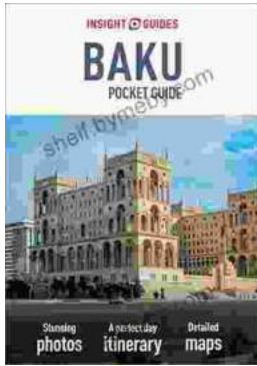
